# 11:40 - 12:30 | Breakout Groups: Round 1

1. Building the Teacher Pipeline: Teacher turnover and a weak pipeline are leading to a significant number of teacher vacancies (there were over 5,000 at the start of this school year). While demand for new teachers is high, our schools of education are producing far fewer graduates than they once did. What will it take for our public schools to recruit and retain a diverse, well-prepared workforce?

This session will feature data on the pipeline for educators, first-hand accounts about the realities of working in schools, and a discussion of promising practices to recruit, retain, and diversify the education workforce both locally and nationally.

3. What Will It Take to Crack the Nut? Ensuring All Students Learn to Read by Third Grade: Reading is a cornerstone skill that all children should master by third grade. Yet in NC, 68% of 4th graders are not reading proficiently according to the latest NAEP assessment. The long-term ramifications of this are severe and far-reaching. As the "science of reading" gains momentum nationally, and in NC, the journey toward effective implementation is just beginning. We still have much to learn about what it will take to finally "crack the nut" to ensure all students learn to read proficiently in elementary school and continue strengthening those reading skills through high school graduation.

This session offers a deep dive into NC's historical performance on reading benchmarks compared to other states. It will also explore the "science of



reading" training efforts and will share emerging insights from initial implementations in NC and beyond. Lastly, the session will discuss strategies to position our state as a national leader in reading instruction.

4. Building the Leadership Pipeline: Many of the same challenges that impact our teacher pipeline also play out for school and district leadership as well. Key leaders are retiring or resigning at a faster clip than districts can adequately prepare their replacements. This year alone, 30 of 115 (or 26%) of school districts experienced a superintendent departure. Business leaders can attest: such high turnover is detrimental to an organization's culture, climate, and overall performance.

	5. The Future of High School: A 2020 study by McRel International, titled 'The Silent Epidemic,' revealed that 40-60% of U.S. high school students are "chronically disengaged." This disengagement carries severe long-term ramifications. While dropping out of school is an extreme outcome, most disengaged students remain in school but lack direction, failing to link their academics with future aspirations. Consequently, they often graduate aimless, facing a heightened risk of prolonged disengagement, underemployment, or other adverse outcomes.
	This session will explore promising strategies to redesign the high school experience, aiming to engage students and equip them with the skills and knowledge to realize their aspirations. It will spotlight innovative approaches gaining momentum in NC and beyond, and discuss the crucial support that the business community has provided in these initiatives.

	6. Reducing Complexity, Increasing Transparency in School Finance: NC's outdated and intricate financial management system poses significant challenges for educational districts across the state. Large districts grapple with the complexity as they manage annual budgets that can exceed \$2B, while smaller ones have to navigate these systems without even a single finance officer. This inhibits district leaders from effectively overseeing operations and leaves the public in the dark about how their tax dollars are utilized.
	This session will highlight the shortcomings in NC's current financial and record-keeping systems and will delve into the inefficiencies plaguing various funding approaches. Finally, it will explore viable solutions that could streamline these processes for improved transparency and management.
